On the 20th July 2019 we celebrated **the 50th Anniversary of man landing on the moon**. In 1969 Apollo11 was manned by Neil Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins. The Croydon Epilepsy Society AGM was on Tuesday 21st May 2019 at at the East Croydon United Reformed Church hall.

Cicely Mary Barker was a popular children's book author, illustrator and British artist, born June 28, 1895 in Croydon. As Cicely Mary Barker suffered from epilepsy as a child, she was unable to go to school, so was educated at home where her creative drawing and writing skills were nurtured and developed at such an early age. She was best known for a series of fantasy illustrations depicting fairies and flowers. Barker's art education began in girlhood with correspondence courses and instruction at the Croydon School of Art.





Her earliest professional work included greeting cards and juvenile magazine illustrations, and her first book, *Flower Fairies of the Spring*, was published in 1923. Similar books were published in the following decades. She died in 1973.

During the summer months find time to visit the **Cicely Mary Parker Memorial Garden** at Park Hill Park, Croydon.

There is currently a project to fund a community garden in the park which is located next to the memorial garden.

Purple Day is an international grassroots effort dedicated to increasing awareness about epilepsy worldwide. Purple Day was created in 2008 by Cassidy Megan, a young Canadian girl who has epilepsy. Her aim was not only to raise awareness of the condition but to also get people talking about it. She wanted people with epilepsy to know that they were not alone.

## Many people ask Why Purple?

The first response to this question is that Cassidy chose the colour purple for the day because **Lavender** is officially the international flower, come symbol, of epilepsy.

There is also a medical reason. According to medical research Lavender and the colour purple act as a relaxant and anti-convulsant and is included in some of the medication prescribed to epilepsy sufferers and other neurological conditions.

## **Croydon Health Services Neurology Department:**

If you are a local support group requesting more information on epilepsy and for a speaker to come to your group to talk about epilepsy and the support available to those who may have epilepsy or be a carer for someone who has the condition - please email for general enquiries <a href="mailto:ch-trspecialistmedicine1@nhs.net">ch-trspecialistmedicine1@nhs.net</a>.
