The funeral and celebration of Stephen's life was on Friday 25th October which I attended with a number of members of the society. The service was well attended with not only family and friends attending but a number of local councillors including Tony Newman, the leader of Croydon Council. There was a reception afterwards at Ruskin House, South Croydon.

Stepehen was an avid supporter of the **Disabled People Against Cuts** and co-founder of Bromley and Croydon DPAC. The society will be making a donation to Croydon DPAC in memory of Stephen. He was also a trustee of **People First**.



His mother Rosemary was able to attend and also his brother David and his niece Jamie who both travelled from Australia.

We were asked to wear red as Stephen had a keen interest and liking of red buses and those attending were offered a model bus from his large collection to remember him. He will be missed by all those you knew him and by the community at large.

Fairfield Halls Reopening



A star-studded ceremony celebrated the **reopening of Fairfield Halls** on the 16th September following a multi-million pound council-led restoration of the iconic Croydon venue.

Special guests included Dame Judi Dench, who reopened the Ashcroft Playhouse in honour of her friend and Croydon-born actress the late Dame Peggy Ashcroft, and Mayor of London Sadiq Khan, who formally opened the building.She unveiled the People's Picture a giant commemorative mosaic by artist Helen Marshall. Anniversary of the Croydon Tram Crash

A civic ceremony took place in New Addington on **Saturday 9th November**, to mark the third anniversary of the Sandilands tram derailment. More than 60 people were injured in the incident and seven people were killed.

The Crown Prosecution Service announced before the anniversary the driver of the tram, Alfred Dorris, from Beckenham, who was expected to be charged with gross negligence manslaughter, but will not be, due to a lack of evidence. Transport for London will also not face charges of corporate manslaughter. The official report by the Rail Accident Investigation Branch concluded that Mr Dorris fell asleep whilst approaching a bend at four times the speed limit just after 6am.TFL has introduced additional safety measures since the crash, including infrared eyeball monitors to alert drivers if they show signs of falling asleep.



Cannabis-based Medicines Update


In November it was announced the approval for the NHS to use two cannabis-based medicines in treating epilepsy and multiple sclerosis and was welcomed by campaigners as an "important first step."

New guidance from the **National Institute for Health and Care Excellence** will allow doctors to prescribe Epidyolex for rare types of epilepsy - Lennox-Gastaut and Dravet syndromes. There are up to 9,000 people who suffer from rare types of epilepsy which Epidyolex has been approved for. However, it did also said that more research was needed on cannabis-based medicines to treat other forms of epilepsy.

Brain "Pacemaker" that stops Epileptic Fits in their Tracks

In June, an article in the Mail On Sunday referred to a "**pacemaker**" that can detect and even stop epileptic seizures that is being used by the NHS for the first time. Simukai Shambira, from Surrey, who endured up to 14 seizures daily, has become the first patient in Europe to be fitted with an implant, and the nine-year old has seen his seizures reduced to a few per week.

The SenTiva device is a game-changer for those who fail to respond to epilepsy drugs. The implant - the size of a £2 coin - is being used by experts at King's College Hospital in London after being granted approval by the Europeam Commision in April. It uses an advanced type of brain stimulation called **vague nerve stimulation**, or VNS.
